





USS Grasp (ARS-24) was a <u>Diver-class</u> rescue and sal\u00edage ship commissioned by the <u>U.S. Navy</u> during <u>World War II</u>. Her task was to come to the aid of stricken vessels. ■

USS Chilula (ATF-153) was a <u>Navajo-class</u> <u>fleet tug</u> constructed for the <u>United States Navy</u> during <u>World War II. [2]</u> Her purpose was to aid ships, usually by towing, on the high seas or in combat or post-combat areas, plus "other duties as assigned."

LSM-262: A Landing Ship Medium (LSM) was an <u>amphibious assault ship</u> of the <u>United States</u>

Navy in <u>World War II</u>. Of a size between that of <u>Landing Ships Tank</u> and <u>Landing Craft Infantry</u>, 558 LSMs were built for the USN between 1944 and 1945. Most of vessels built on this frame were regular transports, while several dozen were converted during construction to specialized roles.

A New Stage in Life

Charlie Baca stopped singing in 1983 because the "smiling eyes" he looks for in an audience had

A few months later, after working a booth at an industrial show at the Convention Center, he went to the Sheraton Hotel lounge and heard Beth Keyo and Chris Cordova performing "My Funny Valentine."

Baca, a 61-year-old baritone, was so moved that he climbed on stage in mid-song and sang the rest of the

"We thought we had a heckler in the crowd," recalled Keyo.

"Ninety-nine-point-nine percent of the time when someone (from the audience) grabs the mike - it's bad," said Cordova. But he said Baca's performance fell in the other 0.1 percent. "We were blown away."

Baca, who has performed in movies and theater before, recovered his enthusiasm for performing - the "smiling eyes" that help him stay enthusiastic during a performance.

For the past several Sundays, Baca has sung with the Beth Keyo Duet at City Lights Tayern & Grille, 9401 Coors Blvd NW. The duoturned-trio includes Keyo, who sings and plays bass; and Cordova, who plays keyboard and performs comedy routines. Cordova describes their music as "20th century

Besides singing in night clubs since 1958, Baca also has local theater experience, primarily with the Albuquerque Light Opera.

"My 12 years in theater was out of the goodness of my heart," Baca said. "I was not doing it for the pay."

Baca said he always has enjoyed singing and had his own group, "Natural Persuasion," which performed around New Mexico from 1973-83. The group featured Gloria Wilson, keyboard; Johnny Martin, guitar; and Ken Fanning, drums.

"Most anything I do is pleasing and pleasant," said Baca. "I'm not trying to pat myself on the back -I'm good at what I do."

One of his favorite songs to perform is "My Way." "Everybody calls it 'the National Anthem.' Baca said.

Baca is a man constantly on the move. He stays healthy with a daily three-mile walk starting at 6:30 a.m. He keeps his legs in shape to play numerous sports, including softball with the Palo Duro Senior Center team, volleyball, golf (a 15handicap) and bowling.

He also does a lot of charity work with a sidekick, Bud Warner. They perform at senior centers and Veterans' Hospital.

On 28 January 1945, *Idaho* departed <u>San Diego</u>, bound for Pearl Harbor. There, she joined the bombardment group, which proceeded to the Marianas and then on 14 February steamed north to <u>Iwo Jima</u>, the target of the next major amphibious assault. The ship bombarded the Japanese defenders on 19 February as the Marines went ashore; *Idaho* remained there for nearly a month before withdrawing on 7 March to replenish at <u>Ulithi</u>. [8]

On 21 March, *Idaho* joined <u>Task Force 54</u> (TF 54), the Gunfire and Covering Group under the command of <u>Rear Admiral Morton Deyo</u>, as the flagship of Bombardment Unit 4 for the <u>invasion of Okinawa</u>.



Tildon was a radio man (RM3C) aboard the destroyer USS Caldwell (DD-605) from January 1945 to his discharge in 1946.

USS Caldwell was damaged by a kamikaze attack in December 1944. Temporary repairs made at San Pedro Bay, Philippines, fitted *Caldwell* for the voyage to San Francisco where she was again put in fighting trim. April 1945 saw the destroyer

once more in her familiar role as convoy escort, this time in support of the invasion of Tarakan, Borneo. Caldwell bombarded Tarakan (11–12 May), then moved to cover the minesweeping operations off Brunei Bay. Here, on 27 June, she detonated an influence-type mine, but escaped with moderate damage and no casualties. After temporary repairs at Victoria, Australia, she sailed to San Pedro Bay, P.I., for final repairs. She was there when hostilities ended. Escort of landing craft convoys to Okinawa and Leyte followed in September and October 1945. After a visit to Tokyo Bay, Caldwell returned to the States; she was placed out of commission in reserve at Charleston, South Carolina, on 24 April 1946.
